- 21 The technology itself in iris image is nothing more than an image of the colored portion of the

22 eye. Every time a child boards and or exits the school bus the parent will get an email or a text

- 23 message and they will get the image of the child's photograph, a Google map of where they
- 24 boarded or exited the school bus as well as the time and date.
- 25 All that in just two seconds.
- 26 Eyelock is another iris scanning company. Its technology is also being used on school buses, along
- 27 with high security offices and banks.

- 29 Our algorithms will get the best images of your right eye and the best images of your left eye.
- 30 Scanning for security has been around for a while, but it's getting more popular.

- 31 That's because advances in technology mean that the scanners can now be built quicker and
- 32 cheaper. This scanner is for airports.

- 34 While iris scanning may be effective it does raise concerns especially when it's used in schools.
- 35 Parents of students at all levels are worried about where those images could end up and who'll
- 36 have access to date showing their kid's whereabouts.

- 38 I would wonder where the database for this information is going to go naturally.
- In Florida recently, angry parents objected to an elementary school scanning their kids' eyes without their consent. For now, the information collected by the scanners is owned by the school district, but as the market expands, so do the possible security risks.

- There's going to be people that come into this market that don't have the thought process if you would, they aren't going to be security safety driven, naturally that's not going to happen and we want to make sure as we are in this industry we are doing everything we can to do it the right way.
