



Prevent next generation from getting characteristics or diseases. Increase human lifespan up to 30 years. 	 Only the rich can afford it; two-tier society. Superiority of a race. Non-designer babies: risk of missing job opportunities (second-class citizens). Lack of individuality; uniformity. Interfere with nature. Unbalance: too many men or women. 

[...] [T]hinking, including ecological thinking, has set up "Nature" as a reified thing in the distance, under the sidewalk, on the other side where the grass is always greener, preferably in the mountains, in the wild. [...] Just like a reflection, we can never actually reach it and touch it and belong to it. [...] [O]ur concepts of "faceless generous mother nature" are based on "sedentary" agricultural societies with their ideas of "possession." The myth of the faceless mother provides the very motivation for our exploitation of Earth, seen as "inexhaustible matter for things." Wilderness areas are giant, abstract versions of the products hanging in mall windows.
